PM Press is reprinting all five novels in Ken **Wishnia's** Edgar-nominated series featuring Ecuadorian-American investigator, Filomena Buscarsela, with introductions by Barbara D'Amato, Gary Phillips, Reed Coleman, Alison Galyin, and Liz Martinez, also a short story extra in each one. *23 Shades of Black* was re-published in 2012. The second, *Soft Money*, (a Library Journal Best Mystery of the Year) is out now, and *The Glass Factory* comes out in August. Two titles are coming next year. Kate Lincoln will read from her novel, *Natural Selection*, at the MWA reading at KGB bar on July 29 (see more info below). The unpublished novel is currently being offered by her agent.

Cathi Stoler will join other Mystery Writers of America authors on July 29 at the KGB bar in Manhattan where she'll be reading from her new novella, *Nick of Time*. Her second novel in the Laurel Imperiole/Helen McCorkendale series, *Keeping Secrets*, will be published by Camel Press in October, followed by the third book in the series, *The Hard Way*, coming out in February, 2014.

Terrie Farley Moran sold another story to *Alfred Hitchcock Mystery Magazine*. "Knowledge is Deadly" will appear later this year. "Bobby Wycoff is Dead" was in the June 2 issue of the e-zine *Beat to a Pulp*. Terrie also sold her *Read 'Em and Eat Cafe* mystery series to Michelle Vega at Berkley.

The Malfeasance Occasional: This inaugural e-zine project from CriminalElement.com, to publish later this summer, will have the story "Magda" by Cathi Stoler, and "The Barnacle" by Hilary Davidson's story. The M.O. is edited by Clare Toohey (who will also be reading at KGB on July 29), with invaluable assistance from Laura K. Curtis (Kramarsky), whose romantic suspense Twisted will be published by Intermix/Penguin in November.

Death Will Help You Leave Him, the second novel in the mystery series featuring recovering alcoholic Bruce Kohler by **Liz Zelvin**, is out in a new e-book edition at http://tinyurl.com/death-leave on Amazon.

Kathleen Ryan's short story, "A Primal Force" is in the soon-to-be-released e-book tentatively titled, *Grand Central Noir*, a collection of stories published in honor of the 100th Anniversary of GrandCentral, published by Metropolitan Crime, a new press created by Terrence McCauley, who is coeditor with Richie Narvaez. Kathy will attend the Public Safety Writers Conference in Las Vegas in July and serve on three panels. She participated in "Noir at the Bar NYC III" in January along with **Hilary Davidson** (below), Matthew J. McBride, Terrence McCauley, Tommy Pluck, Justin Porter, S.J. Rozan, Seamus Scanlon, and Albert Tucher. The evening was hosted by Todd Robinson and Glenn G. Gray.
