Our chapter hosted a wide variety of programs this year. Our in-person programming at the Jefferson Market Library in the fall had low attendance; this was one reason we chose to meet via Zoom for the remainder of the 2022-2023 season. We do plan to bring in-person programming back this September. A recent member survey indicated that many are eager be together again, but also appreciate Zoom and hybrid options.

Our February event was a panel entitled WHICH CONFERENCE IS RIGHT FOR YOU, moderated by chapter member **Triss Stein**, author of the Erica Donato mysteries. The panelists were: chapter member, and Bram Stoker Award-nomintated Elizabeth Crowens, author of both alternative fiction and Hollywood suspense; chapter member and recently elected board president Lori Robbins, author of both the On Pointe and Master Class mystery series; and Connecticut Chapter member Wendy Whitman, author of the trillers Premonition, and the soon to be released Retribution. The panel brought a wide array of conference experience to the table. So, how much swag should someone bring to a conference? A lot! And which conferences are the best for authors to connect to fans? Bouchercon, Malice Domestic and Left Coast Crime were top of the list.

In March, award winning author of the Kolya Petrov mysteries, S. Lee Manning moderated the panel SPIES—THEN AND NOW. The panelists were: chapter member and Agatha-nominee Mally Becker, author of *The Turncoat's Widow*, and *The Counterfeit Wife*; Carmen Amato, author of the award-winning Emilia Cruz mystery series; and James W. Ziskin author of the Anthony, Barry, and Macavity Award-winning Ellie Stone Mysteries. This fascinating discussion included a host of topics, including how espionage has changed from colonial times to the present. In April, were were joined by Minatour Marketing assistant **Dulce Botello** for **EVERYTHING YOUR PUBLICIST NEEDS YOU TO KNOW**. This program

provided an insider's view of what publishers do to market their books and how authors can maximize their publicity efforts. A lot of practical marketing advice was offered. For example, authors should 'think globally, but act locally." Approach local bookstores and libraries is a great first step. Other topics included when to engage (or not engage) with reviewers, book tours and of course, maximizing one's presence on social media. This event is also available in the Members Only section of our website.

In May we held our **THIRD ANNUAL QUERYFEST.** We welcomed **Helga Schier**, Editorial Director from CamCat Books; **Cassie Knight** and **Renee Wildes** from Champagne Book Group; and **Eleanor Teasdale**, publisher at Angry Robot and Datura books. After a brief panel covering the dos and don'ts of querying, members (who had submitted queries in advance) joined one of the panelists in breakout room for a query evaluation.

The new board is already busy planning events for 2023-2024. Events will all be posted on our website, and chapter members should also keep an eye out for the monthly greeting from our new chapter presidents.


